

Love remains

What should your true love gift you on the third day of Christmas? How about the reminder that Saint John was the "beloved disciple" of Jesus? As the dust settles on our often-hectic

celebrations of Christmas, remember that "faith, hope, and love remain . . . but the greatest of these is love." So don't fret if your holiday feast doesn't include a Nigella Lawson masterpiece; simple love should be the main course — and makes for the best leftovers.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 1:1-4; John 20:1a, 2-8. "Beloved: What was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen . . . and touched with our hands concerns the Word of life."

Wednesday, Dec 28, 2022 FEAST OF THE HOLY INNOCENTS, MARTYRS

Dry every tear

In the midst of celebrating the great octave of Christmas we are reminded that Jesus was born into a world much like our own: filled with violence and terror, impacting especially the most vulnerable. Pope Francis stated in his 2016 address for the Feast of the Holy Innocents: "Christmas is . . . accompanied, whether we like it or not, by tears. . . . It is the sobbing of mothers bewailing the death of their children in the face of Herod's tyranny and unbridled thirst for power. Today too, we hear this heart-rending cry of pain, which we neither desire nor are able to ignore or to silence." How shall we respond, to bring some comfort to those who grieve?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 1:5—2:2; Matthew 2:13-18. "Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you."

Thursday, Dec 29, 2022 FIFTH DAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD True joy

Simeon blessed Mary and Joseph and he prophesied to Mary about the destiny of this child and the suffering she would undergo for his sake. There is a certain paradox for those blessed by the Lord. Mary was given the blessedness of being the mother of the Son of God. That blessedness also would become a sword which pierced her heart as her Son died upon the cross. She received both a crown of joy and a cross of sorrow. But her joy was not diminished by her sorrow because it was fuelled by her faith, hope, and trust in God and his promises. Jesus promised his disciples that "no one will take your joy from you" (John 16:22). The Lord gives us a supernatural joy which enables us to bear any sorrow or pain and which neither life nor death can take way.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:3-11; Luke 2:22-35. "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel."

Friday, Dec 30, 2022 FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY, AND JOSEPH All in the family

Families come in all sorts of shapes and sizes. One thing they all share, however, is that they are not perfect. "Perfect families do not exist," said Pope Francis in a 2015 address. "This must not discourage us. Quite the opposite. Love is something we learn; love is something we live; love grows as it is 'forged' by the concrete situations which each particular family experiences. Love is born and constantly develops amid lights and shadows." As we remember the Holy Family, let us also recommit ourselves to this kind of love within all our family experiences.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Sirach* 3:2-6, 12-14 or *Colossians* 3:12-21; *Matthew* 2:13-15, 19-23. *"And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection."*

SEVENTH DAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD Slow down to celebrate

Part of the wisdom coming to us from our long Church tradition is found in the realisation that some mysteries take a while to unfold. That is why during the Christmas season we celebrate the great mystery of God in the world for an entire octave, the eight days between Christmas and the solemnity tomorrow of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God. As we approach the end of this great celebration, ponder for a few moments how the mystery of this event has unfolded for you this year. And take a moment to feel the joy of Christmas once again. TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 2:18-21; John 1:1-18. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."
